of our mascot.



This way we still have our Far Eastern ties, since the statue represents a figure from Ming Dynasty China.

If very few Pacific students ever understand the current Boxer stands for, or even what it is supposed to be, isn't it kind of a silly mascot? We have the opportunity to have a more spirit oriented mascot, but still keep our tradition and Far Eastern ties alive in our Boxer statue.
