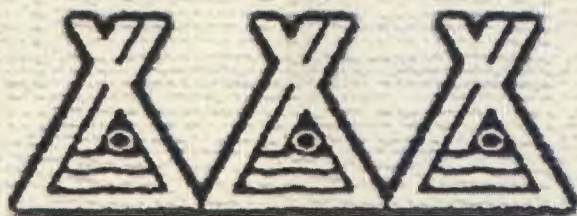

Pi-Ume-Sha celebrates the anniversary of our Treaty of 1855. In the treaty negotiations that took place in June 1855, our leaders looked to the future and reserved specific rights for future generations. Those reserved treaty rights remain critical to the survival of our people and our culture.

The treaty of 1855 ceded 10 million acres of land in North Central Oregon to the United States Government and guaranteed the Tribes a reservation of 665,000 acres, as well as reserve fishing, hunting and gathering rights in the ceded lands.

In a larger sense, the Treaty represents a peaceful solution to conflict and provides an assurance of respect for the sovereign right of these tribes to self-government.

This dinner celebrates the cooperative relationships of these two sovereigns and honors Oregon's Governor, past and present.

At Pi-Ume-Sha, we honor the signing of the Treaty and those far-seeing leaders who negotiated to preserve these important rights.
