Mike Donahue	Landing first at the Red Sea Port City of Jeddah, the so called Singapore of the Arab world, the Governor's party was taken by limousine to this palatial waiting room. For security reasons, no pictures could be taken of the airport itself.
	Staring at the opulent use of crystal, teak, gold leaf and marbel, former carpet dealer, Vic Atiyeh was especially impressed with the antique Persian rugs.
	While the rest of the 747's passengers endured the hot ordeal of customs, the Oregonians remained here and were served fruit juices.
	A representative of the protocol office expedited the delegations paperwork. It's carry-on luggage was never checked.
	A state department official told the Governor his visit is bringing Oregonians out of the Saudi woodwork. Already the demand to see him has scheduled a reception with the American ladies of Jeddah.
