ITINERARY IT-CT 635

SATURDAY, JULY 20 - Depart Portland via Northwest Airlines Jet to New York, connecting with Scandinavian Airlines Jet Express to Bergen, Norway.

SUNDAY, JULY 21 - Upon arrival, our travel agent and our Norwegian guide will meet us and provide transfer to the HOTEL ALREK. Evening - Leave the hotel by motor coach on "Folklore Tour" for a unique introduction to Norwegian country culture. You will enjoy a typical country-meal served by the people of Fana who, garbed in colorful costumes, will perform traditional dances.

MONDAY, JULY 22 - BERGEN - ULVIK. Morning 2-hour tour through the city including the University, St. Mary's Church, the earliest church in Norway, built in the 12th century, the German Quay, relics of the Hanseatic League's town-within-a-town and the Fish Market, thence proceed by cable-car up Mt. Floyen to view one of the most spectacular panoramas on the Continent. Soon after, leave Bergen for the Fjord-country. Lunch at Norheimsund, facing the Hardanger-fjord with snow-capped mountains across the blue water. Afternoon - continue along the fjord via the pretty little village and port of Granvin to Ulvik. HOTEL BRAK ANES.

TUESDAY, JULY 23 - ULVIK - LOM. Full day scenic drive including the Sogne fjord and Jotunheimen Mountain district. View the Skjervefoss Waterfalls enroute to Voss, then via Vinje, Vik, Sogne fjord to Vangnes. Thence cross the fjord by ferry to Hella and continue drive to nearby Leikanger for lunch Afternoon - proceed on the Sognefjell Mountain Road, ascending to the mountain and glacier realm of Jotunheimen, 4690 feet above sea level, then down the romantic Boverdal Valley to Lom. FOSSHEIM TURIST HOTEL.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 24 - LOM - OSLO. Drive southward through the Ottadal Valley via Vaga to the charming village of Otts, then along Gudbrand Valley. Motor in a scenery of smiling lakes, forests, past rivers and quaint Norse farms via idyllic villages before reaching the popular resort town of Lillehammer for lunch. Visit the Maihaugen Park, an open-air museum, then on along the Lake of Mjosa, via Edisvoll, where the constitution of Norway was drafted in 1814, arriving in Oslo around 6:30 P.M. HOTEL VIKING.

THURSDAY, JULY 25 - OSLO. Morning at leisure. Hotel is conveniently located next to the Karl Johans Gate, the main shopping street flanked by lovely parks and interesting buildings. Afternoon - Grand Tour of Oslo - see the Parliament, the University from 1811, and Royal Palace, built in the 19th century, then up-hill to the Holmenkollen with Ski-Museum from where proceed to Vigeland Sculpture Park and on to Bogdoy with the Folk Museum, the Viking ships, the Polarship - "Fram" and the Kon Tiki Museum, returning to the center along the piers, the City Hall and Akershus Castle, finished by Christian IV, as royal residence 1318-1380. After dinner, special arrangement made to meet with Norwegian families in their homes.

FRIDAY, JULY 26 - OSLO. Morning round table discussion on subjects relative to the country; afterwards you will either visit the International Summerschool of the University or meet with a group of Oslo students. Afternoon at leisure, for shopping and independent activities, and to prepare for the morning departure to Sweden.

SATURDAY, JULY 27 - OSLO - KARLSTAD. Morning drive along the Fjord of Oslo to Vinterbru, from where proceed inland through agricultural districts with lovely forests, past the beautifully situated village of Orje, then across the Swedish border and on through the delightful province of Varmland to Karlstad. HOTEL GOSTA BERLING. Time permitting, an excursion will be made into the nearby Fryksdalen Valley and Fryken Lakes location of Selma Lagerlof's home (writer about the region immortalized by her "Gosta Berling's Saga").

SUNDAY, JULY 28 - KARLSTAD - UPPSALA. Motor through the heart of Sweden by way of Karlskoga with the internationally known BOFORS armaments firm and steelwork, on through the village of Lekhyttan before arriving in Orebro for lunch. After lunch, continue drive via Vasteras, another industrial center with real continental flavour from its 15,000 immigrants and refugees from both Eastern and Western Europe; then on through the Vastmanland province, branching off at Litslena to motor direct to Dag Hammerskjold's hometown, and the seat of the Archbishop of Sweden - the old University town of UPPSALA. HOTEL GILLET.

MONDAY, JULY 29 - UPPSALA -ABO. Morning - attend a seminar at the university, after which proceed Tour of Town. Visit the Cathedral, the foremost example of Swedish Gothic Church architecture and the largest cathedral in Scandinavia.

Time pemitting, a visit to the castle will be made, after which continue general drive through the town before terminating at the FLUSTERET Restaurant for lunch, an old favorite among the Uppsala students. Afternoon — motor southward to visit the charming little place of Sigtuna, founded in the 11th century, with many interesting remains; and college which is considered one of the best in Sweden. Thence drive to Stockholm and transfer direct to the pier in time to embark ovemight steamer destined to Finland.

TUESDAY, JULY 30 - ABO (TURKU) - HELSINKI. Morning - arrive Abo (Turku) - Finland's oldest and most historic town. After brief tour of town, leave by way of Nummi and arrive in Helsinki in time for lunch. Balance of day free. HOTEL TORNI

WEDNESDAY, JULY 31 - HELSINKI. Morning - visit Ervi's Porthania University and attend seminar. After lunch, "City sightseeing tour"; see the Olympic Stadium with its imposing tower, the President's Palace, the statues of "The Three Black Smiths" and the "Maid of Helsinki", the Suurkirkko, and the Uspenskaia Cathedral, a Russian Orthodox Church constructed in 1886. Evening - "MEET THE FINNS" - visit homes of private families.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 1 - HELSINKI - STOCKHOLM. Morning at leisure for shopping and independent activities. Those wishing to try a Finnish bath, "The Sauna" are urged to use this morning. After lunch, transfer to the pier and board overnight steamer sailing direct to Stockholm.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 2 - STOCKHOLM. Morning - arrive Stockholm and transfer to HOTEL REISEN. After a short free interval, leave hotel to meet with a leading newspaper man, who will conduct a round table discussion on "Sweden's Policy of Neutrality During The 2nd World War and Today". Afternoon arrangements include several visits at social institutions. Evening - "MEET THE SWEDES" - as in Norway and Finland, you will visit Swedish families in their homes.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 3 - STOCKHOLM. Morning at leisure and for shopping. Hotel is conveniently located next to the shopping districts (shops will close up for the Week End at 1:00 and 2:00 P.M.). Afternoon - "Grand Tour of Stockholm"; see the famous City Hall, considered one of the most beautiful contemporary buildings in Europe, and the Riddarholm Church; then proceed to the old town for a short walk to visit the Royal Palace, the great landmark of the capital. Evening - visit the world famous Djurgarden.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 4 - STOCKHOLM. Sunday morning at leisure. Afternoon - leave hotel to visit the famous VASA-ship raised last year after 300 years at the bottom of Lake Malaren. Early dinner is served before leaving town to attend a performance at the Drottningholm Theater.

MONDAY, AUGUST 5 - STOCKHOLM - GRANNA. Leave Stockholm driving through the fertile province of Sodermandland via the 13th century Nykoping, across the Eastern Gotaland plains to Linkoping for lunch. Afternoon - continue along the famous Gota Canal route, passing the lock at Berg, on via Motala and through medieval Vadstena along Lake Vattern to the 'Pear Town' - Granna. HOTEL GOLDEN OTTER.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 6 - GRANNA - COPENHAGEN. After breakfast, continue southward along Lake Vattern through Jonkoping, the Match Kingdom of the World, on via Varnamo through a delightful lake and forest district before reaching the fertile plains of the Skane province and Halsingborg. Then board the ferry to cross the Oresund and enjoy a thrilling view of Hamlet's Castle, Kronborg in Denmark. Thence motor down through Sealand to the capital of Denmark, Copenhagen. EGMONT HOTEL. Evening — attend performance of the Royal Danish Ballet.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 7 - COPENHAGEN. Full day at leisure. Evening - leave for the world-famous TIVOLI Gardens for dinner. Return to hotel at midnight, after having spent all evening in this never-to-be-forgotten place.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 8 - COPENHAGEN. Morning sightseeing tour of wonderful Copenhagen: See Rosenborg Castle with the Crown Jewels, Nyboder, and the statue of "The Little Mermaid" inspired by Hans Christian Andersen's fairytales; then via the impressive Gefion Fountain to the Royal Palace, see the changing of the Guards. Return via the Royal Opera House, the Parliament, The Cathedral and the old University. Afternoon — attend a seminar, followed by visits to social institutions as planned. Evening — "MEET THE DANES", special program invites you to visit private families in their homes.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 9 - COPENHAGEN - HARWICH. After wonderful days in Copenhagen, motor through the fertile country-side past lovely villages across Sealand to the port of Halskov to board the ferry to the Funen Island; then proceed to Hans Christian Andersen's home town of Odense: visit his home and museum and continue direct to Esbjerg over the Little Belt bridge to Jutland and via medieval Kolding in time to board steamer sailing to Britain.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 10 - HARWICH - CAMBRIDGE - LONDON. Forenoon arrival at Harwich and proceed through the Essex region direct to Cambridge where part of the afternoon is spent visiting the University Colleges and attending a brief seminar, after which continue drive to London. HOTEL MOUNT PLEASANT.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 11 - LONDON. Morning at leisure. After lunch leave London to Eaton College, the largest and most exclusive of the English public schools; see also Windsor Castle, and then continue through the delightful country side to visit Hampton Court Palace. Evening at the Palladium.

MONDAY, AUGUST 12 - LONDON. Morning tour of London's West End: See the Marble Arch, Piccadilly Circus, the Royal Parks and St. James Palace; witness the changing of the Guard at the Buckingham Palace, then via Westminster Cathedral and South Kensington Museums, motor along the Thames heading for the Houses of Parliament to see the Big Ben and Westminster Abbey. Return via Whitehall and Trafalgar Square: Afternoon arrangements include a series of seminars on various subjects.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 13 - LONDON. This last day in London includes a tour through the City of London: See St. Paul's Cathedral with the Crown Jewels, then through the principal streets of the City's commercial and financial world to Dickens' Old Curiosity Shop, ending up at the Overseas Bureau Office, where a seminar on "The Classes in European Society" is planned. Afternoon at leisure. Evening — "MEET THE BRITISH".

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 14 - LONDON - STRATFORD. Morning drive to Oxford, the picturesque and ancient university city on the rivers Cherwell and Thames. Visit a few of the colleges and the University Church of St. Mary, followed by a brief seminar. Afternoon - drive northward through idyllic villages to the typical Tudor town, Stratford-Upon-Avon. HOTEL WHITE SWAN. Evening - attend a performance at the Shakespeare Memorial Theater.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 15 - STRATFORD - NOTTINGHAM. Morning - visit Shakespeare's birthplace, the Holy Trinity Church, and Anne Hathaway's Cottage; then continue to Warwick to visit its famous Castle and Coventry, known from the legend of Lady Godiva. After lunch, proceed northward via Leicester to Nottingham. HOTEL FLYING HORSE.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 16 - NOTTINGHAM - WINDERMERE. A most interesting day lies ahead as you drive through Sherwood Forest and on by way of Chesterfield, Sheffield and Leeds to the medieval town of York. See its ancient fortifications and the curfew bell, etc. Lunch at Harrogate; then via Settle and Kirkby Lonsdale proceed through the beautiful Lake District past the old town of Kendal, known as the "Auld Grey Town" to Windermere. HOTEL WINDERMERE

SATURDAY, AUGUST 17 - WINDERMERE - EDINBURGH. Morning at leisure in this fine resort. After lunch, proceed through the lovely lake district, then by way of Ambleside and Keswick continue northward past Carlisle, an ancient border town, the scene of many bloody border skirmishes between the English and Scots. Upon entering Scotland, continue drive via Hawick and Selkirk, a Royal Burgh to Edinburgh. HOTEL ROXBURGHE.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 18 - EDINBURGH. Morning tour of Edinburgh: See the famous Edinburgh Castle, the National Gallery, St. Giles Cathedral, the Royal Scottish Museum and the Old University; then to Holyrood-house, Scotland's most important Palace. Return via Princes Street. Afternoon - proceed to the University of Edinburgh to participate in a most interesting program. Evening - attend a performance of one of the world's outstanding cultural events, the Edinburgh Festival of Music.

MONDAY, AUGUST 19 - EDINBURGH - ABERDEEN. Morning - head for the Highland; driving via the Queensferry, cross the Firth of Forth, then by way of Kinross and Perth, drive to Glamis, the childhood home of H. M. Queen Elizabeth. Thence through Fofar and Brechin to Stonehaven, proceeding along the coast to Aberdeen. HOTEL NORTHERN.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 20 — ABERDEEN — PITLOCHRY. Morning — visit St. Machar Cathedral, the only granite cathedral in Scotland, and then proceed to the University, which is noted for its high standards of education. After orientation and a brief seminar, continue drive along the Valley of the Dee past Balmoral Castle, to the pretty village and highland resort of Braemar for lunch. Afternoon — resume drive through Devil's Elbow and "Glen Shee" to Pitlochry. HOTEL FISHER'S. Evening — to the Pitlochry Festival.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 21 - PITLOCHRY - GLASGOW. Drive along Loch Tay to Killin, then southward to Callander, branching off to enter the heart of the Trossachs, one of the most famous beauty spots in the highland. Then continue via lovely Loch Katrine and through the small resort town of Aberfoyle to Stirling for lunch. Visit the famous Stirling Castle, and then proceed to Glasgow. HOTEL GEORGE.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 22 - GL ASGOW. Morning at leisure. Afternoon - visit the University, followed by a seminar, after which proceed on a brief sightseeing tour through the city, including a visit to the Cathedral. Evening - Farewell Dinner at the Malmaison Restaurant.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 23 - GLASGOW - NEW YORK. Morning free - time for packing. After an early lunch, transfer to the airport for departure via SAS Jet Express to New York City, connecting with Northwest Airlines Jet flight arriving in Portland in the evening.

RESERVATIONS: A deposit of \$100.00 per person must accompany your reservation. This deposit may be paid directly to Churchill Tours or through Professor A. C.
