WALKER PRESENTS HISTORICAL WORKS

Rare Volumes Given to Albany Public Library by Old Pioneer.

Learning that the Linn County Historical Society, through the president, C. H. Stewart, was making an effort to collect all historical works and the Pacific Northwest, Cyrus H. Walker, today presented to the library association at the solicitation of the society, a valuable collection of instorical books, which he had collected during his life time. The books are going to be placed in the Albany public library, where they will be at the disposal of the public.

No other gift to the library is more appreciated or valued. The members of the historical society are very grateful to Mr. Walker for his gift. It fills a long felt want as the society has been scouring all sources for such material without success. Many of the books included in Mr. Walker's gift are very rare, only a few copies being in existence.

The following is to be printed on the fly leaf of each book: "Presented to the Albany Public Library Association in trust for the boys and girls of Albany, Or., and vicinity by their friend, Cyrus Hamlin Walker, oldest living Oregon native son, born at Whitman Mission, Oregon Territory, December 7, 1838.

"This book is to be used for public service, (unless sooner worn out) as long as the Panama Canal endurs, the opening of which is celebrated today.
