Dear Mary

I received no letters from any one today but will write
 some and especially one to you. I send a copy of the Pacific, with several
 items marked. I talked to the Indians from the one on last page the
 S S Lesson. There were but 22 Indians present. There played the organ
 Mrs Lacey. Mrs Jackson & Mrs Blair were there Mrs B for the first
 time. Also Mr Williamson Mrs Starr's brother & Ernest were
 there. Mrs Starr gets 16⁰⁰ per month. at I presume Josh Peneche's, one

 Mr Starr & Miss Crane came home from Penneville this evening.
 I send Ocho's Review, with one item marked about the hard winter.
 They are going to ride the 15th I think I will only get Antone

I expect we had better remain in service. All employes in service ^{since June 30}
get only the old salaries for July & August. The cooks are to get
480⁰⁰ and Industrial Teachers 720⁰⁰ from Sept 1st. The matron at S
gets 480⁰⁰ as before. 2 assistants (Korean) are allowed each school.
I sent word to Martha Jacobs to come in if she wanted the place.
We want to get in a few children right off. Martha is at Lekelequa
and Alta, Doc Tyler, Henry Benjamin & Edward Harvey. Sam has
gone to work on de Di papers. He is going to the Dales with Mr Davis
tomorrow to make contracts. Mr Luckey is going to see Mr B the flour
contract & Mr Davis the Chop & Bran. Mr Davis wants to withdraw
his flour contract any way since it is going to be so late before he
can haul the flour in. Mr McC^{oy}, I think bid very low on flour

how he can pay 60⁰⁰ for wheat & deliver flour guaranteed as good as sample
