1981 OFFICIAL INAUGURAL EVENTS

INAUGURAL OPENING DAY CEREMONY

The official opening of the Presidential Inaugural will be held at the Lincoln Memorial, January 17th, at 6 p.m. The ceremonies are free to the public and feature the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and the United States Army Band. They will also include a peeling of the bells throughout the city, a laser light show and a fireworks extravaganza unsurpassed in pyrotechnic history.

GOVERNORS' RECEPTION

This afternoon ceremony honoring incumbent Governors and Governors-elect of the fifty states and territories takes place at the Sheraton Washington Ballroom between 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 18. The Hotel is at 2660 Woodley Road, near Connecticut Avenue.

Guests are invited for a one-hour period only (1:30-2:30, 2:30-3:30, or 3:30-4:30 p.m.). The times for which they are invited are indicated by color-coded tickets. Tickets are \$10 per person. Each guest will receive a special Reception favor.

Because of the size of this Reception, there are very limited facilities to check coats. Parking facilities also are very limited. Therefore, it is recommended that guests use shuttle buses from major downtown hotels. 6 By special invitation.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE

Every Inaugural celebration includes a worship service; although President-elect and Mrs. Reagan expect to attend a service at the National Presbyterian Church on Sunday, January 18, the official Inaugural religious observance will be held at the National City Christian Church. The service will begin at 1:30 and conclude at about 3:30 p.m. The Church stands on Thomas Circle, Massachusetts Avenue and 14th Street, N.W.

INAUGURAL CONCERTS

Since George Washington's first Inauguration in New York in 1789, an evening of distinguished music traditionally has been a highlight among Inaugural ceremonies. On Sunday evening, January 18, classical performances will be presented at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. On stage will be internationally renowned artists from the world of opera, ballet and classical music. Guest artists will be performing with symphony orchestras during the programs.

At the DAR Constitution Hall, there will a 3 p.m. farewell performance by Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians. Chamber music in the Eisenhower Theater at 7:30 p.m., opera and ballet in the Opera House at 7:30 p.m., and the National Symphony in the Concert Hall at 9 p.m., all in the Kennedy Center. Mikhail Baryshnikov, Lorin Maazel, and Mstislav Rostropovich are featured artists at the Kennedy Center. By special invitation.

CANDLELIGHT DINNERS

Two Donor Candlelight Dinners are being given on the Roof Terrace of the Kennedy Center for 2500 guests. These dinners will be held in conjunction with the Inaugural Concerts on Sunday, January 18, 1981. The first Candlelight Dinner begins at 6 p.m. and ends shortly before the 9 p.m. Concert Hall performance by the National Symphony. The second dinner is from 10:00 p.m. until 12:30 a.m. It follows the two concerts in the Opera House and in the Eisenhower Theater which start at 7:30 p.m. Dress will be black-tie. By special invitation.

DISTINGUISHED LADIES' RECEPTION

On Monday morning, January 19, at 11 a.m. an elegant reception will be held at the Kennedy Center to honor the First Lady, Mrs. Reagan, and the wife of the Vice President, Mrs. Bush. Arrangements will be made for transportation to and from the Kennedy Center and pre-arranged locations. Champagne and punch will be served at the reception. Tickets are \$10 each. By special invitation.

SENIOR CITIZENS AND HANDICAPPED RECEPTION

A reception to honor Senior Citizens and the Handicapped will be held at the Department of State in the Diplomatic Reception Rooms, a magnificent setting with some of the rarest and most beautiful American furnishings. This is scheduled for Monday, January 19, between 2 and 4 p.m. By special invitation.

RECEPTION FOR THE VICE PRESIDENT-ELECT

On Monday, January 19th, between 2:30 and 6 p.m., there will be a reception to honor Vice President-elect Bush at the National Museum of American History (until recently, called the Museum of History and Technology) at 12th Street and Constitution Avenue, N.W. Refreshments will be served. Admission charge is \$10. Reception tickets are only available at "Will Call" (see page 14), not at Smithsonian. Guests are welcome only during specified hours; because of fire safety regulations it is essential that time commitments be honored. By special invitation.

INAUGURAL GALA

The first gala ever to be held at the Capital Centre, Landover, Maryland, will be a star-studded evening of memorable music and top entertainment. It will be held Monday, January 19, at 7:45 p.m. Frank Sinatra is the Gala's Director of Entertainment. He has planned an extraordinary extravaganza with Johnny Carson as host. The Gala will be televised nationally, but not in the Washington area. Tickets for boxes seating ten cost \$10,000. Regular admission tickets cost \$150 and \$100. By special invitation.

Tickets for orders placed after January 6 must be picked up at "Will Call" (see page 14). Bus tickets for the Gala are available for purchase at "Ticket Will Call" and hotels (see page 16) for \$10, round trip.

INAUGURATION CEREMONY

The historic 35-word oath is the center of this imposing ceremony, to be held for the first time at the West Front of the Capitol. Previous Inaugurations have been held on the East Front. The change has been made so that there will be more room for spectators. Capitol grounds accessible by special invitation only; if you hold tickets you must allow ample time to reach your designated viewing area. The January 20 ceremony begins at 11:30 a.m. It will be telecast.

PARADE

"America — A Great New Beginning" is the theme of the 1981 Presidential Inaugural Parade which will be held on Inauguration Day, Tuesday, January 20. The parade is scheduled to leave the Capitol vicinity one hour and fifteen minutes after the conclusion of the Inaugural Address.

An official escort of elected and appointed government officials, Senators, and Representatives will precede President and Mrs. Reagan and Vice President and Mrs. Bush from the Capitol traveling west on Constitution Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue.

The Parade of military, high school and college bands, equestrian groups, military units and selected floats will form on the Mall and will start at 4th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., continuing west on Pennsylvania Avenue. Since Washington weather in January is unpredictable at best, the warmest layered accumulation of clothing should be worn by those viewing the parade downtown.

Seats in the reviewing stands are available to those who have purchased tickets according to procedures described on page 14. Standing room is available along the route, free to all.

OUTDOOR CONCERT

TODAY Show's Willard Scott will emcee the Outdoor Concert on Inauguration Day. This open-air tribute to America's New Beginning is slated to begin about 4:00 p.m. on the Mall side of the Capitol, following the parade. Highlights of the Concert include honoring the recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor, the New York City Police Department Bagpipe Band, The Citadel Band of Charleston, South Carolina, and other highly acclaimed marching bands. In addition, well-known entertainers will cap the event. This Concert is offered to the public free-of-charge.

INAUGURAL DAY SKY SALUTE

Spectacular aerial fireworks will illuminate the City's monumental core from the Capitol and Supreme Court down the Mall and over the Potomac beyond the Lincoln Memorial for television and a special audience of 200 Congressional Medal of Honor men and their families. This tradition of fireworks for Inaugural festivities dates far back into the 19th century. The 1981 display begins at sunset on Inauguration Day, after the parade and outdoor musical program. Within a fifteen-minute period, 10,000 shells will be fired.

INAUGURAL BALLS

Some forty thousand guests in Washington will participate in the Inaugural Balls at four hotels, three Smithsonian buildings, the Kennedy Center and at the Pension Building which was a favorite Ball site in the 19th century. Cabinet officers, Supreme Court Justices, Ambassadors and Chiefs of Mission, Governors of the States and Territories, Senators, and Members of the House of Representatives will be among the guests present. The President and Mrs. Reagan plan to make stops at all the festivities, as do Vice President and Mrs. Bush. All other guests, notables included, will attend only one gathering.

Check Hospitality Booths for complimentary bus service from commuter lots and many hotels to the balls. Various locations are designed by color-coded tickets which are valid only for the site specified. Besides the Pension Building and the Kennedy Center, Ball sites include the Museum of Natural History, the Air and Space Museum, and the Museum of American History (until recently called the Museum of History and Technology), as well as the Mayflower, Shoreham Americana, Sheraton Washington, and Washington Hilton Hotels. Special invitations are required for the purchase of tickets, which cost \$100 per person. Boxes seating eight cost \$2,000.

Notables from the world of entertainment will act as masters of ceremonies at the balls. The entertainment will be coordinated by Marty Pasetta, who directs the satellite broadcasting of the Academy Awards. Closed circuit television of the Washington parties will be shown at 105 satellite balls held all over America in hotel ballrooms, civic centers, and similar facilities under the auspices of a variety of local sponsoring groups. The highlight of the evening will be comments by President Reagan. The television coverage will include backward glances that take the form of film clips of previous Inaugural celebrations. The network of live big-screen satellite closed-circuit telecasts includes more Americans than ever before in the Inaugural activities. Americans abroad will be celebrating the night of January 20th. There will be an Inaugural Ball at the Conciergerie in Paris, the first such party overseas.

Other parties in the Nation's Capital on the night of Inauguration Day include a Young Voters' Gala (for those under thirty) featuring entertainment and music chosen to please the young. At the Mayflower Hotel, by special invitation.

ADMISSION TO CEREMONIES

While the Commemorative Invitation to the Inauguration conveys the hope that you can be present in the City of Washington for this historic occasion, the Invitation itself admits you to none of the Inaugural events that require tickets. Except for the Parade tickets, special invitations for each event are required in order to purchase tickets of admission.

PARADE TICKETS

Tickets for grandstand seating for the Inaugural Parade will be offered for sale on a first-come, first-served basis at "Ticket Will Call" at Union Station (see details below) beginning on Friday, January 16, 1981. Cash, checks and credit cards will be accepted for payment. Tickets prices are \$15, \$25, \$75, and \$100. A map on page 24 explains where grandstand seats have been erected. It also shows the Parade route where ample standing room is available without charge.

INVITATIONS "TICKET WILL CALL"

Persons holding special invitations to official events who have not yet submitted their checks may telephone "Ticket Will Call" to determine whether tickets are still available. The number is 382–8054. Tickets for orders received after January 6, 1981, must be picked up at "Will Call", located in the East Wing of the National Visitors' Center at Union Station, First Street and Massachusetts Avenue, N.E. "Will Call" is open from January 7th through 20th, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday–Saturday, and from 10 a.m.–6 p.m. on Sundays.

If you cannot appear in person at "Will Call" to pay for and collect your tickets, please be sure that your representative is properly identified and has your letter of authorization, written on your letterhead.

METEOROLOGICAL FOOTNOTE: The highest recorded D.C. temperature for any January 20th is 71°, the lowest is 3°. If average weather conditions prevail for January 20th, the temperature will be 37° with partly-cloudy skles, wind 10 m.p.h. or less and a 20% chance of precipitation. There is a 5% chance of snow.

The Hospitality Booths, staffed by members and volunteers of the Hospitality Committee, can provide information on city highlights, transportation needs, ticket availability, medical emergencies, state society meetings, and more, for Inaugural weekend visitors, as well as the latest *developments* or *changes* in the schedule of Inaugural events during the hours of 9 a.m.-9 p.m., January 17 through January 19 and from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. on January 20.

TRANSPORTATION

Hospitality booths and hotels have special bus schedules and Metro (subway) information available for visitors. Free shuttles, where offered, are the best way to go from many hotels to official Inaugural events. The presence of many visitors as well as the blocking of the Parade route make public transportation easier than private cars. For \$10 round trip there will be buses from many hotels to the Inaugural Gala; tickets for this are sold at hotels (see page 16) and "Ticket Will Call" (see page 14).

Allow ample time to reach your destination. Dress warmly enough to remain comfortable during possible delays. When the subway route coincides with your destination, the most efficient method of transport will be underground. The Parade route and the Mall area are notably well-served by the Metro (subway) system.

Taxis charge by a zone system and there is a rushhour increase. Drivers will not change large bills.

Exact change required for bus fares which vary with time of day, with rush hour increase like cabs and subways.

STATE SOCIETIES

Gatherings sponsored by various State Societies during the Inaugural week are listed at the Information Center of the Inaugural Committee. Consult them by phoning 382-8439 or 751-2000, ext. 247. Inquire also at Hospitality booths.

VETERANS ACTIVITIES

The Presidential Inaugural Committee-1981 is honored to host an estimated 200 recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor and their wives. This is nearly double the number of Medal of Honor winners ever to have attended a Presidential Inaugurai. The Honor Guard of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be at area airports on Saturday, January 17, to welcome them. The VFW will honor the medalists at a reception at the Sheraton Washington on Sunday evening. On Monday, AMVETS will host a breakfast for the Medal of Honor Society and the Joint Chiefs of Staff will honor this group at lunch. The Disabled American Veterans will host a buffet at their Maine Avenue Headquarters Monday evening.

Tuesday morning, the Reserve Officers Association will host a brunch at their headquarters at One Constitution Ave., N.E. The medalists and the national leadership of the various veterans groups will assemble on the Capitol grounds for the swearing-in and later watch the parade and fireworks display.

That evening the American Legion will give a "Salute to Heroes" Banquet. Later, the medalists and other members of the veterans community will attend the Veterans Inaugural Ball at the Capital Hilton. By agreement with veteran organization leadership, President Reagan will not appear at the Veterans Inaugural Ball but will greet those present by telephone.

CULTURAL EVENTS COMMITTEE

Along with the museums of the Smithsonian Institution the Cultural Events Committee welcomes the public to a series of free musical programs, including jazz, chamber music, mariachi, Japanese Koto, Country and Western, Blue Grass, Big Band sounds and military music, all celebrating America's cultural diversity. Singers range from the Airmen of Note and the Singing Sergeants to barber shop quartets, gospel choirs, classical soloists, and Irish, Cajun, and Appalachian folk singers and dancers. Throughout the city, museums are offering special Inaugural exhibits. These cultural events are listed in free brochures available at Hospitality Booths, Visitors Center, the Smithsonian Museums and at hotels.

The co-chairmen of the Presidential Inaugural Committee-1981 wish to express their gratitude to the Jimmy Carter Memorial Trust for its generous contribution to the cultural events program.

MEDICAL COMMITTEE

The Medical Committee has set up a Command Post near Ft. McNair in Room 2-914, Building A, 2nd and T Street, S.W. Washington, D.C. to serve people who need emergency medical and health assistance. This Committee sponsors medical aid rooms, warming tents, first-aid stations and comfort stations which are conveniently located for special events and all along the Parade route.

ETHNIC FESTIVITIES

The rich mix of America's racial and national composition is celebrated in many ways during the Inaugural Week. In addition to the on-going ethnic entertainment and culinary offerings at Union Station (Visitors Center), our ethnic heritage will be the theme for several parties and cultural exhibitions during this Inauguration. Please consult daily newspapers for exact time and location. Representatives of various nationalities, in native dress, will be present at all Inaugural events adding to the color and festive air of the occasion.

HISPANIC RECEPTION

For the first time, Hispanic Americans have an official event during Inaugural festivities which highlights their rich cultural heritage. The event, featuring entertainment and dance music with a Latin flavor, is scheduled for Sunday evening, January 18, at the Capital Hilton, 16th and K Streets, N.W., in the Presidential Ballroom. Guest appearances by many Hispanic celebrities will add to the festivities. By special invitation.

RECEPTION HONORING BLACK VOTERS

A formal reception will be held from 8 to 11 p.m. on Saturday, January 17, 1981, at the Sheraton Carlton Hotel to honor the National Black Voters for Reagan/Bush and the Honorable Samuel R. Pierce, Secretary-designate of Housing and Urban Develop-

ment. Live entertainment, open bar, buffet supper, and a raw seafood bar will be offered. Tickets are \$75.

SALUTE TO AMERICA'S HERITAGE

Held first in 1973, the Salute to America's Heritage honors the diverse contributions of America's ethnic and national groups, including American Indians, to our pluralistic society. There will be a multi-ethnic exhibit and demonstration of native arts and crafts, a broad sampling of specialty foods and ethnic music and dancing performances for your entertainment. 

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

Inaugural History

The United States Capitol has been the traditional site for most inaugural ceremonies. This year, however, President-elect Ronald Reagan will take the oath of office on the West Front of the Capitol for the first time in history.

Thomas Jefferson was the first President to take the oath at the Capitol in Washington. In 1829, Andrew Jackson moved the swearing-in ceremonies outside to the East Front, establishing a precedent which guided inaugurals for over 100 years.

Under special circumstances, other Presidents have taken the oath in various parts of Washington, D.C., and the Nation. John Tyler and Andrew Johnson were inaugurated in Washington hotels, and Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman were each inaugurated once in the White House. George Washington was sworn in on Wall Street in New York City, Calvin Coolidge in Plymouth, Vermont, and Lyndon B. Johnson aboard Air Force One.

Beginning with Washington's second term in 1793, Presidents were traditionally inaugurated on March 4. Adoption of the Twentieth Amendment to the Constitution changed that date to January 20.

Prior to this change, there was only one aspect of the inauguration written into the Constitution—the Presidential Oath contained in Article II, Section 1:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of the President of the United States, and will to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Places of Assembly

Order of Procession

Every four years, the House of Representatives and the Senate pass separate resolutions declaring that they will convene at 10:30 on the morning of January 20 to participate in the Inaugural Ceremonies. While in session, both Chambers move to the Inaugural Platform and then recess upon completion of the ceremony.

Members of the House of Representatives will proceed as a body from their Chamber and be seated on the House side of the President's Platform.

The Senate will proceed as a body from its Chamber and be seated on the Senate side of the President's Platform.

The Governors of the States will assemble in the Old Senate Chamber before being escorted to the Platform. They will be seated in boxes to the left of the President.

The Ambassadors and Ministers of Foreign Countries will assemble in the Rayburn Room, H-207 in the Capitol, prior to being escorted to the Platform. They will be seated in boxes to the right of the President.

The Chief Justice of the United States and Associate Justices of the Supreme Court will assemble in the Old Supreme Court Chamber in the Capitol. Members of the Cabinet of the President-elect will assemble in Room H-227 in the Capitol. Both groups will be escorted to their seats on the Platform.

When these groups and other distinguished guests are seated in their designated places on the Platform, the wife of the President, of the Vice President, of the President-elect, and of the Vice President-elect will be escorted to the President's Platform.

The Joint Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies will escort the President and Vice President to the President's Platform. The Committee also will escort the President-elect and Vice President-elect.

Entrances to the Senate and House Wings

Cards or tickets of admission to the Senate and House Wings will be good only at the doors beneath the arches under the East Steps of the Senate and House Wings. These doors will be opened at 9:30 a.m. to ticket holders. Persons presenting themselves at any other entrances will be refused admission.

Tickets

Tickets to those sections of the Inaugural site designated as A, A-1, A-2, B, B-1, C-1, C-2, D, D-1, E, F, and all standing room tickets will not admit visitors to the Capitol Building.

Tickets allowing access to the Senate side of the Capitol and the Inaugural Platform must be presented at the door beneath the arch under the East Steps of the Senate Wing. These tickets must also be presented at checkpoints in the Capitol.

Tickets allowing access to the House Wing of the Capitol and the Inaugural Platform must be presented at the door beneath the arch under the East Steps of the House Wing. These tickets must also be presented at checkpoints in the Capitol.

Tickets to Sections A, A-1, and A-2 should be presented only at Gate 1, New Jersey and Independence Avenues, S.E., or Gate 8, Delaware and Constitution Avenues, N.E.

Tickets to Sections B and B-1 should be presented only at Gate 7, New Jersey and Constitution Avenues, N.W.

Tickets to Section C-1 should be presented only at Gate 5, First Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., or Gate 6, First Street and Constitution Avenue, N.W.

Tickets to Section C-2 should be presented only at Gate 3, First Street and Independence Avenue, S.W., or at Gate 4, First Street and Maryland Avenue, S.W.

Tickets to Section D should be presented only at Gate 2, South Capitol Street and Independence Avenue.

Tickets to Section E should be presented only at Gate 6, First Street and Constitution Avenue, N.W.

Tickets to Section F should be presented only at Gate 3, First Street and Independence Avenue, S.W.

A map giving the Gate and Section locations is included in the invitation packet.

Regulations for the Capitol Building

The Capitol Building and Subways will be closed after 5 p.m. on Monday, January 19, and will be kept closed until 9 a.m., Wednesday, January 21.

The Senate and House sides of the Capitol, including the Rotunda and Crypt, will remain closed to the public until 9 a.m., Wednesday, January 21.


No persons will be admitted to the Capitol without an admission card or ticket signed by the Chairman of the Joint Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies.

All doors to the Rotunda and Crypt will be closed and passageways leading thereto will be kept clear. National Statuary Hall will be closed.

No one will be permitted to pass from the House or Senate Wings through the Rotunda or Crypt except Members of Congress, its officers, and escorted guests. Members, officers, and escorted guests will be provided special, non-transferable cards of admission.

All vehicles will be excluded from the Capitol grounds until after the conclusion of the ceremonies.

The Sergeant at Arms of the Senate, the Sergeant at Arms of the House, and the Executive Director of the Joint Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies are charged with execution of these arrangements.

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

Through these programs we hope the public will have a chance to celebrate the inaugural with music which links today's Americans directly to the Nation's cultural roots.





George Herbert Walker Bush was born in Milton, Massachusetts, on June 12, 1924. He graduated from Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts, in June 1942, and immediately enlisted in the U.S. Navy. At age 18, he was the youngest commissioned pilot in the Navy at that time.

He served from August 1942 to September 1945 as a naval aviation cadet and carrier pilot, and fought in the Pacific, winning three air medals and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Returning home, he entered Yale University, completed his economic degree in 1948 graduating Phi Beta Kappa, and captained the varsity baseball team.

After graduation, Mr. Bush moved to Texas where he worked as a trainee and then as a supply salesman for Dresser Industries in West Texas and California from 1948 to 1950. He co-founded a small royalty firm, Bush-Overbey Development Company, in 1951. In 1953, he co-founded Zapata Petroleum Corporation, and one year later—at age 30—Mr. Bush became president and co-founder of a third firm, Zapata Off-Shore Company. The fledging firm pioneered in experimental off-shore drilling equipment. Today much of the energy produced around the world is drilled for by the rigs that Zapata pioneered.

He was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1966 from Texas' 7th District. One of the few freshmen members of Congress ever elected to serve on the Ways and Means Committee, Mr. Bush was re-elected to the House without opposition two years later.

During his congressional service, he was active in legislation dealing with problems of excessive government spending and inflation, national defense, civil rights, quality education, natural resources and environmental matters.

From 1971 to 1973, he served as the United States Ambassador to the United Nations and as Chairman of the Republican National Committee from January 1973 to September 1974.

In October 1974, Mr. Bush traveled to Peking and served for more than a year as Chief of the U.S. Liaison Office in the People's Republic of China, a sensitive and complex assignment during a time of deepening hostility between the PRC and the Soviet Union.

He was then appointed Director of Central Intelligence, where he helped write the Executive Order that guaranteed the protection of civil rights of U.S. citizens, and restored morale and efficiency after a period of disorganization in the U.S. intelligence community.

In July 1980, Mr. Bush was selected by Ronald Reagan to be his running mate at the 1980 Republican convention, and on November 4, was elected Vice President-designate of the United States.

He is married to the former Barbara Pierce of Rye, New York. They are the parents of five children: George, 34; Jeb, 27; Neil, 25; Marvin, 24; Dorothy, 21; and the grandparents of George and Noel.

Mr. and Mrs. Bush are residents of Houston, Texas, and are members of St. Martin's Episcopal Church, where he is a former vestryman. He currently serves on the vestry of St. Ann's Episcopal Church, Kennebunkport, Maine, and is on the board of the Episcopal Church Foundation.

His father, the late Prescott Bush, served as U.S. Senator (R-Conn) from 1952 to 1962.

The inaugural activities of this week represent not only a new beginning but a new opportunity for our nation and our people. To the thousands of Reagan and Bush supporters who have traveled here to Washington and the millions of others throughout the nation, I ask that you join with me in supporting and assisting our next President in the extremely difficult economic, foreign policy and national security problems facing him.

Ronald Reagan was elected our 40th President by an American people who placed in him their hopes to restructure an economy that can grow without massive inflation, for a foreign policy that earns the respect of our allies, adversaries and neutral nations and a national defense that commands the confidence of free people and those who want to be free. Perhaps most importantly, Ronald Reagan was elected because the American people are looking to new leadership with new ideas to provide again the opportunities of life that all Americans have been fortunate to know.

The mandate of the 1980 election compels us to move this nation forward in a new direction—away from the programs of the past, but toward the necessary goals that all of our people seek. Under the firm and compassionate leadership of President Reagan, we will seek from Republicans, Democrats and Independents the ideas, the energy and the assistance needed to accomplish a common purpose.

America's men and women look to us for leadership of a new kind. They look to us to return to them those opportunities that have been curtailed by a government that has expanded and grown so large that our national initiative has been curbed. Unshackling our economy and allowing the productive capacity and creative genius of working men and women to flourish again will do much to restore the growth and strength of our economic system, to produce more, to provide more jobs and generate greater economic opportunity for all—especially those by-passed by our system.

Finally, we must never forget the enormous burden of responsibility that was thrust upon us by our founders more than 200 years ago. The United States today, as it has been since its inception, is the beacon that arouses the dream and the powerful desire in men and women to be free.

The responsibility of the United States as the only credible deterrent to the forces of totalitarianism and brutality is greater today than ever. It is a responsibility that we must and will shoulder—recognizing that our limits are not boundless in the pursuit of liberty, justice, equality and opportunity.

During the next four years, as your Vice President, I will dedicate myself to working with President Reagan in achieving a restoration of national honor, a revitalization of our economy and the expansion of freedom and opportunity for the American people, for our nation and for freedom loving people throughout the world. This is his dream. It is mine. It is the dream of all of us.

At this time as our government changes leadership, let us redefine our future. Let us all march together behind a new President who believes that the best of times for the United States are not behind us, but ahead, because we as a free people have confidence in ourselves, our institutions and our ability to solve any problem that faces us.
