As a reporter, Patrick Werr earns about \$1,500 a month. Maybe that is not very much, but consider this, none of that money is taxed and his employer tosses in free housing.

Giving all the restrictions, Werr considers every day something of an education.

Its so undercovered that there really is no body else in Saudi Arabia. There are only a few of us journalists. And you have pretty good access to the businesses.
