Senior Political Reporter Lisa Stark is travelling with the Governor and takes a look at the stop in Jeddah.

The Saudi media has shown lots of interest in the Governor's visit here. Since Atiyeh is the only American governor of purely Arab decent.

One morning in Jeddah, Atiyeh held a local news conference, the Saudi media wanted to know a little more about this place called Oregon.

(through translator) Can you give us some information about the status of the State of Oregon as far as the significance in matters of trade of (mumble). compared to other states?

Oregon is, the population of Oregon is 1 percent of the population of the United States.

The governor talked about wheat exports, joking that now that the Saudi's are self sufficient in wheat production they may try to export to Oregon.

On the touchy subject of Palestians rights, Atiyeh spoke his mind.

The question of a settlement for Palestians is key to settling the unrest in the middle east.

Atiyeh also said that peace is achieved through understanding and that he hopes the delegation carries a message of understanding back to Oregon.

For the Governor and his group there was little chance to browse. It was nearly time for the noon prayer when all shops in this Muslem country must close.
