THOSE MISSING BOOKS.

It is a peculiar coincidence that in a college where the honor system is in vogue there should be posted so long a list of books missing from the library and rather incongruous that two of the absent books are Ethic's books, dealing with how to distinguish between right and wrong. Of the two possible explanations of the disappearance of the books those in charge would gladly have accepted the more charitable explanation, that the books had been kept out through carelessness and a simple reminder would be sufficient to insure their return. But neither the announcement in chapel that the books were missing nor the posting of the entire list to further bring the matter before the student body has resulted in the appearance of the books and indications must now point to deliberate theft. This is difficult to believe, almost unbelievable when we consider how small must be the school spirit of a person who for a little personal gain or private gratification would thoughtfully take and keep a book which belonged to the library.

It would be inconvenient for both library assistants and students if the reference books should have to be placed under the same care as the rare and valuable books in the possession of the library but it may be that such a course must be pursued in order to insure the safe-keeping of our reference books.

For the benefit of the library, for the convenience of the faculty and students and, above all, for the good name of the Student Body of Pacific University, this annual disappearance of books must cease.

CONSTITUTION of the STUDENT HOUSE GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION of the Women of PACIFIC UNIVERSITY.

ARTICLE I. Name.

This organization shall be called the Student House Government Association of the women of Pacific University.

ARTICLE II. Object.

The object of this Association shall be to control all matters pertaining to the government of women students in dormitories and private residences, other than the homes of parents or guardians; the making of all house customs and rules, and enforcing the same; and in general to further the best interests of the women, so far as lies in its power.

ARTICLE III. Members.

All women of Pacific University, resident in college houses, or in private boarding houses, are members of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. Government Agencies.

Sec. 1. Officers. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and Chairman of Off-Campus Committee. The President of Herrick Hall shall be President of the Association.

Each College House shall have as officers a President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer.

Sec. 2. Controlling Bodies. The government of this Association shall be vested in The House Council and The Advisory Board.

The House Council shall consist of the President of Herrick Hall, the Chairman of the Off-Campus Committee, the other officers of the Association, and the Proctors.

The Advisory Board shall consist of the President of the College, the Dean of Women, resident instructor in Herrick Hall and the Presidents of the different houses.

There shall be in each hall of residence a committee consisting of the House Vice-President, and other members, who shall be called Proctors, in number as many as the House Council shall decide.

There shall be an Off-Campus Committee consisting of a Chairman, and as many of the Proctors as the House Council shall appoint, which committee shall see that the regulations which control the conduct of students in college houses shall also control students living in private residences other than the homes of parents or guardians.

ARTICLE V. Elections.

Sec. 1. The President of Herrick Hall shall be President of the Association. She shall be elected from either the Junior or Senior class, and shall have lived at least one year under House Government. No other person shall be eligible to this office without the approval of the Advisory Board.

Sec. 2. The other officers of the Association shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Association on the general election day.

Sec. 3. The term of office shall be one college year, or until successors are elected.

Sec. 4. The officers of each House

shall be elected by the members of that house on the second Saturday of the school year.

Sec. 5. The general election of the Association shall be held on the third Saturday of the school year.

Sec. 6. Any member obliged to be absent from an election may leave her vote in writing with the chairman.

Sec. 7. In the case of a Senior President, a temporary chairman shall be elected the second week in June, to serve in the fall in place of the President until the regular election, and as Vice-President during the rest of the year, unless she be elected President, in which case a new Vice-President shall be elected.

Sec. 8. The Proctors of each college house shall be nominated by a committee appointed by the House President. The term of office shall be one college semester or less, as determined by the House. The election of Proctors shall be held at the beginning of each semester and at any time thereafter, at the discretion of the President of the House.

ARTICLE VI. Duties of Officers and Boards.

Sec. 1. Duty of Association President. It shall be the duty of the President of the Student House Government Association to preside at all meetings and to further the interests of the Association.

Sec. 2. Duty of House President. It shall be the duty of the House President to call and preside over all meetings of the house, to appoint committees and special assistants, as needed, to see that the House rules are enforced; to receive all complaints of irregularities from members of the household and from Proctors. For minor offences she shall send the offender a note of reprimand. All offences of a grave nature, and all offences or irregularities repeated after a reprimand has been given, shall be reported by her to the House Council at its next meeting.

Sec. 3. Duty of the Secretary-Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to keep a record of all proceedings, post all notices, keep a list of all officers and committees, to have charge of all funds of the Association, and to keep a strict account of all receipts and expenditures, reporting the same at the Semester meeting. She shall also have charge of the book for registration of absences.

Sec. 4. Duty of the House Council. It shall be the duty of the House Council to assist the President of the Association in enforcing all the rules and regulations of the Association; it shall represent the Association before the Faculty, thru its President; it shall act in all matters provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws. During the first week of its term of office, it shall divide the house into as many districts as it deems necessary for proctors.

Sec. 5. Duty of the Advisory Board. It shall be the duty of the Advisory Board to consider matters referred to it by the House Council, and it may suggest to the House Council matters it may think to be for the good of the Association. It shall act in all matters provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Sec. 6. Duty of Temporary Chairman. It shall be the duty of the Temporary Chairman to appoint temporary proctors and to enforce all rules pertaining to house government until the permanent organization of the House is completed.

Sec. 7. The Vice-President shall

become head Proctor and shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer.

Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the Proctors to enforce the house customs. Each proctor shall be responsible for order in her district, and shall report disorder to the Head Proctor. She shall have power to appoint sub-proctors in her district in case of expected absence, if she deem it necessary. It shall be the duty of the proctors to turn-out hall lights and lock outside doors at the appointed time each night.

ARTICLE VII. Meetings.

Sec. 1. A mass meeting of the members of the Association shall be held not more than four weeks after the opening of the college year for the reading of the Constitution and By-Laws.

Sec. 2. A meeting of the House Council shall be held at least once each semester. A meeting of the Advisory Board shall be held at least once each semester.

Sec. 3. A special meeting may be called at any time by the president or at the written request of ten members of the Association.

Sec. 4. A meeting of the Association shall be held the last week of each semester, which shall be called the Semester Meeting at which a report shall be presented from each officer.

Sec. 5. Business meetings shall be conducted according to Roberts' Rules of order.

ARTICLE VIII. Finance.

A tax of 25c shall be levied on each member of the Association at the beginning of the year to cover expense of printed constitution and incidentals.

ARTICLE IX. Amendments.

Amendments to this Constitution must be submitted in writing to the Advisory Board and House Council at least one week before the meeting of the Association at which they are to be voted upon, and shall be reported by the President of Herrick Hall to the Chairman of the Off-Campus Committee to their respective organizations. A two-thirds vote of the Association shall be necessary for their adoption.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I. Oath and Agreement.

Sec. 1. Oath of Office. Upon her election, the President of the Association shall take the following oath of office: "Before the assembled membership of the Student House Government Association of Pacific University, I promise to administer faithfully and justly, so far as lies in my power, the duties of the office of President."

Sec. 2. Member's Agreement. Each member of the Association shall observe and co-operate with all in enforcing the system of self-government embodied in the following rules and regulations, and shall at the first regular meeting after her admission to the house, sign her name to the constitution and bylaws as a pledge of faithfulness in keeping the laws to the best of her ability.

Sec. 3. The agreement, Constitution and By Laws are to be read annually to the members of the Association at the first regular meeting of the College year. All members must be given a printed copy of the Constitution and By-Laws.

ARTICLE II. Study Hours and Quiet.

Sec. 1. Students are expected to preserve quiet in the halls from 8 a. m. and from 1:15 p. m. to 4 p. m. except on Saturdays. Study hours must be observed from 7:30 p. m. to 9:30 p. m. except on Friday night and Saturday night. After the spring re-

cess, the hours shall be from 8 p. m. to 10 p. m. The Head Proctor shall ring a warning bell at the beginning of the evening study hours.

Sec. 2. After evening entertainment no discussions shall take place in the Hall.

Sec. 3. Girls must not run or walk noisily in the halls and must wear soft slippers after 7:30 p. m. and before the rising bell.

Sec. 4. Doors must be closed without slamming.

Sec. 5. Musical instruments must not be used after 8 p. m., except on Friday night and Saturday night, nor before the rising bell. Instruments on the second and third floors shall not be used after 7:30 p. m. No instruments shall be used between the hours of 2:30 p. m. and 4:30 p. m. on Sunday.

ARTICLE III. Reception Hours.

Sec. 1. Reception hours shall be Friday and Saturday from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. and on week-day afternoons from 4 p. m. until 7:30 p. m. In case of emergency, and with the full knowledge and approval of the Dean of Women or any resident teacher, a student may see a guest at an hour other than those appointed for regular reception. Sunday callers may be received from 3 p. m. to 6 p. m.

Sec. 2. No student shall invite her escort in after returning from an evening entertainment except by special permission from the Dean of Women.

Sec. 3. Members shall in no case receive gentlemen in their private rooms. Fathers are an exception to this rule, and rarely by special permission brothers.

Sec. 4. Under no circumstances, except by special permission from the Dean of Women, are young women allowed to visit young men at their rooms.

ARTICLE IV. Leave of Absence.

Sec. 1. No member of the Association shall be out of her place of residence after 7:30 p. m. (or 8 p. m. after the spring vacation), save when detained by permitted college engagements or when permission has been granted by the Dean of Women. But members may, by permission of the House President, remain out on the campus after the Spring vacation until dark, when all the women are regularly expected to be in their place of residence.

Sec. 2. On leaving town, permission having been previously secured from the Dean of Women, all girls shall register the time of their departure, their address while away, and the time of return. A fine of 25c will be imposed for every failure to register, and will be paid to the Association Treasurer.

Sec. 3. Members wishing to spend the night outside the Hall shall first obtain permission from the Dean of Women.

Sec. 4. Members of the Association shall not accept invitations to evening social functions or entertainments without permission from the Dean of Women; but attendance at the following regular meetings is understood as approved:

Clubs and societies connected with the various departments of Academic work in the college; evening seminars; literary societies; public ora-

torical contests; college debates; public college lectures; religious services; athletic events; entertainments given by permission of the authorities of the college for college classes; or the entire student body.

ARTICLE V. Guests.

Sec. 1. Students must obtain permission from the Matron before inviting any guests to meals or for overnight.

Sec. 2. Students have the privilege of inviting guests for three meals a semester without charge. Meals of guests above that number shall be paid for at the rate of 15c for breakfast, 20c for luncheon and 25c for dinner.

ARTICLE VI. Miscellaneous Regulations.

Sec. 1. Girls are not to ride horseback or to drive unless accompanied by some person approved by the Dean of Women.

Sec. 2. No visits shall be paid to the offices of doctor or dentist without consulting the House President or the Dean of Women. No doctor may be summoned to Herrick Hall but by the Dean of Women or one she appoints to act in her place when away.

ARTICLE VII. Rooms.

Sec. 1. All rooms shall be in order during the day. Saturday the time is extended to 10:30 a. m.

Sec. 2. All pictures must be suspended from the picture molding. Nails, tacks, nor paste must be used on kalsomined walls.

Sec. 3. Rooms must not be changed without consulting the Dean of Women or Matron.

Sec. 4. As the occupants are held personally responsible for all damage to the rooms, the Association will see that both individuals and the rooms are protected from damage thru practical jokes, such as rough-housing or other molestation.

ARTICLE VIII. Meals.

Sec. 1. Girls are expected to be punctual at meals. It is not expected that any member of the household will leave the dining room before evening prayers.

Sec. 2. Notification shall be given to the Matron of any absence from meals.

ARTICLE IX. Lights.

Sec. 1. Lights shall not be left burning unnecessarily or when the occupant is out of her room.

Sec. 2. All lights shall be turned out at 10 p. m., with the exception of Friday night and Saturday night, when the time shall be extended to 10:30 p. m. Except in case of emergency or by special arrangement with Matron they are not expected to be on between the hours of 10 p. m. and 5:30 a. m.

Sec. 3. Each student may keep her light burning later than this — times each semester, but must report the fact in advance to the proctor of the district in which she resides, who shall keep a record of the same.

Sec. 4. Nights when college engagements hold after 9:30 p. m., lights must be out within thirty minutes after said engagements.

When two or more persons in same room use the lights after 10 p. m., each one shall report to the Proctor.

ARTICLE X. Penalties.

Sec. 1. Repeated failure to observe

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the regulations will be dealt with at the discretion of the House Council.

Sec. 2. The action of the House Council is subject to revision by the Association except in cases which the approval of the President and Faculty of the College has been obtained.

Sec. 3. The House Council has the power to suspend, or expel, subject to the approval of the President and Faculty of the College.

Sec. 4. A fine of 15c shall be imposed on every member of the Association who is absent from a special or regular meeting without excuse acceptable to the House Council.

Sec. 5. A fine of 25c will be imposed for every failure to register absence from the House.

Sec. 6. Fines are to be paid to the Association Treasurer.

ARTICLE XI. Amendments.

Amendments to these By-Laws must be submitted in writing to the Advisory Board and House Council at least one week before the meeting of the Association at which the amendment is to be voted on, and shall be reported by the President of Herrick Hall and the Chairman of the Off-Campus Committee to their respective organizations. A two-thirds vote of the Association shall be necessary for their adoption.

Debate Tryout On April 2.

The lists of registration for debate are closed and the tryout will be held Thursday, April 2nd. All but one of the men who represented Pacific last year are in school this season so three of the places are practically cinched but there will be keen competition for the fourth place and the substitutes positions. Among the new material Maroney, Milton and Burns

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have good prospects although the other contestants have had previous experience.

Remember the Home Coming.

Two years from the present time all the old grads and former students will be making preparations to attend the big Home Coming week. Some of those who live at the greatest distances will even be starting on their journeys so as to arrive a little ahead of time and become acquainted with the students. Plans are being made to make this the greatest week old Pacific has ever experienced. Every old student you see this spring should be informed of the big event so that he or she will have no conflicting engagement.
