ber ~~that~~ Mr Kinsey said, that Mr.
Bean said, that if the Do does not leave
the Indians will kill him, and says
Mr Kinsey, I believe they will. I replied,
The Catholics have not got that
Station yet. Immediately after the
"True American" appeared, I recognized
Mr Kinsey as the ^{person} ~~author~~ ^{referred to} from that con-
viction that night on the Willa, and
named him as the author to the editor.
For some time previous, on learning that I
had proposed to refer Mr Spalding to
Mr Kinsey, as one who could speak on
this subject,
