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

Today, these many years since I wrote that, the Fair still reverberates to the benefit of our great state.

But my feelings about the Fair are even more personal than many might imagine. I have a collection of several hundred "souvenirs" from that grand event. It is a wonderful gathering of medals, buttons, ribbons, a large variety of china and glass, spoons, watch fobs, purses, handkerchiefs, sheet music written just for the Fair, guide books, daily programs—and on and on it goes. Beyond all that it was the place that two newly arrived Syrian immigrants—A. Atiyeh & Bro. ("Bro" was my dad)—won a gold medal for their display. At this point they had only been in Portland since 1900. And believe it or not, in moving several years ago I came across negatives that developed into pictures of my father and uncle actually at the fair!!

It is important to note that this Fair was a massive and enthusiastic community effort the like of which had not been seen before nor (sadly) since. Now sit back and "Go to the Fair" from the comfort of your chair. I highly recommend that journey to you.
