Session Schedule

Oregon's Legislature convenes regularly in the State Capitol at Salem the second Monday in January in each odd-numbered year (January 8, 1973-January 13, 1975). No limitation is set on the length of the session, but within the past few years adjournment has come after four to five months. (The governor is empowered to convene special sessions and there have been 14 such sessions—the most recent in 1971, which lasted 7 days.)

Senate and House

Two houses comprise the Legislature—the Senate and the House of Representatives. The 30 members of the Senate are elected for four-year terms with half of the seats up for election biennially. The House has 60 members, all of which must be elected biennially. Except in the case of persons selected to fill vacancies in office, the members of the Legislative Assembly are elected by the voters of designated 30 senatorial and 60 representative districts at the regular general election held throughout the state in even-numbered years.

To qualify as a candidate for Senator or Representative, one must be a citizen of the United States, 21 years of age and an inhabitant for at least one year in the district where he is elected.

Functions

The Legislature's two primary functions are to enact laws and to furnish an arena for discussion. The Legislature also has influence in some decisions of the Executive Department. The Senate, for example, confirms appointments by the Governor to certain offices specified by law.

The Legislative Assembly exercises its law-making authority subject to the people's powers of initiative and referendum. This means that the Legislature shares with the people its power to enact laws. The Governor has veto power over legislation enacted during a session, but he may not veto an Act referred for a vote of the people or an Act initiated by the people.

A presiding officer is elected by each house of the Legislative Assembly. This officer in the Senate is called the President; and in the House, the Speaker. The President and the Speaker exercise general powers over their House; appoint chairmen, vice chairmen and members to each committee; and make the decisions regarding the appropriate committee to which a bill is to be referred.

Committees

Oregon's Legislature operates under the "open committee system," which enables interested persons to voice their opinion on measures of particular interest. Each legislator serves on several committees. Almost 2,000 bills covering a wide range of subjects are introduced each session, with nearly half of these destined to become law. Most of the work of consideration and revision of these bills is done in committee.

After a bill has been processed by a committee and passed in the chamber in which it was introduced, it is sent to the other chamber where a similar procedure is followed. When both chambers have passed a bill, including any amendments approved by the other chamber, it is enrolled (printed in final form) for the signature of the presiding officers and the Governor.

Bill Enactment

A bill may become law the instant it is signed by the Governor if it has an emergency clause; otherwise it becomes law 90 days after adjournment. By constitutional provision, tax measures may not have an emergency clause. Oregon is the only state of the fifty which assures the people of this right to refer a tax measure by petition before it goes into effect.

Oregon's Constitution provides that the state must not spend money in excess of its revenues. Therefore, the Legislative and Executive Branches must balance the budget. After reviewing, and often revising, the Governor's proposed budget each session, the Legislature passes tax laws which produce revenue needed, then appropriates these funds to state agencies, to local government and to education.

LEGISLATIVE STAFF COMMITTEES

LEGISLATIVE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE:

R. E. Stevens, Legislative Administrator, State Capitol, Salem 97310; 378-8182

The Legislative Administration Committee was established as a joint committee by the 55th Legislative Assembly. The committee consists of the presiding officers of both houses, five members of the House appointed by the Speaker and four members of the Senate appointed by the President.

The Committee coordinates the operations of the Senate and the House of Representatives, controls the form and style of joint publications; provides research facilities and performs service functions for the Legislative Assembly, coordinates the use of all legislative property, and studies ways to improve legislative procedure.

An orientation conference for all new members of the Legislative Assembly is arranged by the Committee prior to each legislative session to acquaint members with the procedures to be followed and the issues they will be facing in the coming session. The Committee has adopted and is implementing a long-range plan for modernizing the interior of the Capitol for better legislative usage and more accessibility by the public.

Studies being conducted by the Committee include ways to reduce the number of state publications; means to improve the staffing of legislative committees; reorganization of responsibilities for processing and distributing legislative publications and how better to maintain and improve legislative records for public usage.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL COMMITTEE

Thomas G. Clifford, Legislative Counsel, 109 State Capitol, Salem 97310; 378-8148

The Legislative Counsel Committee is a joint legislative committee created in 1953 and authorized under ORS 173.111. During the 1969-1971 fiscal biennium it was known as the Joint Committee on Rules and Resolutions. The Committee consists of the President of the Senate and four other members of the Senate appointed by him, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and five other members of the House appointed by him. The President and Speaker are each authorized to designate an alternate from among the members of their house to exercise their powers as a member of the Committee.

The Committee has a continuing existence and functions whether or not the Legislative Assembly is in session. The Committee selects as its full-time executive officer the Legislative Counsel, who employs a legal and clerical staff.

One of the principal duties of the Legislative Counsel and legal staff is the drafting of measures for legislators and legislative committees and, when time permits, for state agencies. Legal opinions and memoranda relating to these measures and other pending legislation are also prepared on request of legislators. Research service may be provided legislative committees at their request.

The Committee may, upon written request, review state agency rules. Through the Law Improvement Committee, the Committee conducts a continuous substantive law revision program.

During each regular legislative session the Committee is responsible for the publication and distribution of the advance sheets of the session laws. The Committee staff prepares, for publication in the legislative calendars and journals, indexes and tables pertaining to all measures introduced. Immediately after a legislative session the staff prepares and publishes a digest of Acts passed, and as soon as possible after the session, publishes and distributes the official session laws. The Committee, through the Legislative Counsel and staff, edits and publishes Oregon Revised Statutes.

LEGISLATIVE FISCAL OFFICE

Floyd J. Gould, Legislative Fiscal Officer, 115 State Capitol, Salem; 378-8152

The Legislative Fiscal Officer is appointed by and is responsible to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means during a session of the Legislative Assembly and to the Emergency Board during the interim between sessions of the Legislative Assembly. The Legislative Fiscal Officer employs a staff of legislative research analysts, assistants and secretarial help, and is responsible for analysis and recommendations to the legislature concerning state expenditures and financial affairs, including the Governor's budget and the organization and functions of state agencies.

The Fiscal Officer and his staff provide research and analytic capability for the legislature, its committees and individual members. During the legislative session, the Fiscal Officer provides staff services to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means, and to the Emergency Board during the interim between Legislative sessions. Individual state programs are reviewed as directed by the Legislative Assembly and by the State Emergency Board.

LEGISLATIVE INTERIM COMMITTEES 1971 - 1972

Findings and recommendations produced by studies of the following Interim Committees are included in each committee's report and were presented to the 1973 Legislature.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO THE STATE LAND BOARD

Cecil L. Edwards, Executive Assistant; Maribel Cadmus, Secretary

This Advisory Committee was created in 1969 to study conflicts in claims of ownership between the state and riparian owners affecting submerged and submersible lands and to make recommendations to the legislature for remedial legislation in the interests of conservation and development.

ALCOHOL AND DRUGS, INTERIM COMMITTEE ON (SJR 14)

Purpose: To study matters relating to drug distribution, usage and abuse in the state; to include the O.L.C.C. and the use and abuse of alcohol and all other mind-altering drugs, legal or illegal. The Committee will recommend legislation to the 1973 Legislature that will enlarge the State's efforts to control drug abuse, increase rehabilitation programs for abusers, and develop preventative usage education programs for all Oregonians to discourage any mind-altering drug usage.

The Commission is charged with formulating proposals whenever it seems advisable, for the adoption of compacts, enactment of uniform or reciprocal statutes and rules and regulations, and other formal and informal means of cooperation among the states, including the interchange and clearance of research and information. The Commission's functions and organization are provided for in ORS 189.020 and ORS 189.030.

JUVENILE CODE COMMITTEE (HB 1844)

Major projects of the Committee during 1971-1972 were revisions of the laws relating to banking and to the environment, the latter limited primarily to air and water pollution control.

TAX, INTERIM COMMITTEE ON (SJR 14)

Purpose: To undertake a comprehensive review of the tax structure, determine new sources of revenue, study questions of tax exemptions and state aid to local governments and such other matters as may be suggested by subsection (1) of ORS 173.510 (1969 Replacement Part); and any such other matters as may be referred to it by the presiding officers.

OUTLINE ON HOW TO FOLLOW THE LEGISLATURE

I. THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

- A. As provided by the Oregon Constitution consists of a Senate and a House of Representatives.
- B. Primary function to enact laws that deal with our citizens welfare, education, environment, economy, and general well being.

II. THE LEGISLATORS

- A. Number set at 30 Senators and 60 Representatives.
- B. Qualifications:
 - 1. Citizen of United States.
 - 2. Twenty-one years of age.
 - 3. Resident of the Legislative District for one year.

III. TERM OF OFFICE

- A. Representatives elected for two year terms.
- B. Senators elected for four year terms.
- C. Elections in even numbered years.
 - 1. Primary election held on fourth Tuesday of May to select candidates from major political parties.
 - 2. General election held first Tuesday of November to elect the legislators.

IV. THE LEGISLATORS FROM YOUR DISTRICT

- A. Each legislator has an office in the Capitol and an appointment can be made to see him.
- B. It is the legislator's duty to represent the people from his district.
 - a) Let him know what you like or dislike.
 - b) Your advice is instrumental in his decision-making.

V. WHEN THE LEGISLATURE CONVENES AND ADJOURNS

- A. Regular session commences on second Monday in January in each odd numbered year.
- B. Special sessions may be called by the Governor.
- C. The length of the session depends primarily upon the amount of business to be acted upon by the legislators.
 - a) As a rule, the session duration is in excess of 100 calendar days.
 - b) The longest session in Oregon history was 153 days in 1967.

VI. THE SESSION BEGINS

A. Generally on Sunday preceding the opening, a separate caucus of each body is held to informally select their leadership and key officers.

- B. The various officers, leaders, and employees for each body would include:
 - 1. President of the Senate
 - 2. Speaker of the House
 - 3. President and Speaker Pro Tem
 - 4. Majority Leaders
 - 5. Minority Leaders

- 7. Chief Clerks
- 8. Journal Clerks
- 9. Reading Clerks
- 10. Calendar Clerks
- 11. Sergeant at Arms

- 6. Secretary of the Senate
- C. Other employees instrumental to the operation of the Legislative Assembly would include:
 - 1. Committee Administrative Assistants
 - 2. Committee Clerks
 - 3. Door Keepers

- 4. Pages 5. Security Guards
- 6. Legislative Secretaries

- D. Inauguration Ceremonies
 - 1. On opening day of session, both Houses convene jointly.
 - 2. Present are the elected state officers and the Supreme Court.
 - 3. Chief Justice then administers oath of office to the Governor.
 - 4. Governor's message is then given—outgoing Governor's message also heard prior to that of the Governor elect.

VII. VIEWING THE LEGISLATURE IN ACTION

- A. The general order of business daily for both Houses shall be:
 - 1.~ Roll Call.
 - 2. Remonstrances.
 - 3. Introduction of memorials and resolutions.
 - 4. Reports of Standing Committees.
 - 5. Reports of Special Committees.
 - 6. Propositions and motions.
 - 7. First reading of House (Senate) bills.
 - 8. Second reading of House (Senate) bills.
 - .9. Third reading of House (Senate) bills.
 - 10. Floor debate and vote on bills.
 - 11. First reading of Senate (House) bills.
 - 12. Second reading of Senate (House) bills.
 - 13. Third reading of Senate (House) bills.
 - 14. Floor debate and vote on bills.
 - 15. Other business.
 - 16. Adjournment.

VIII. VOTING

- A. Two-thirds of the members must be present to transact business. Each body can compel attendance of members.
- B. Voting on the passage of motions or measures is done openly by voice and becomes part of the permanent public record.
- C. A majority vote is required in the passage of measures and ordinary business. The presiding officer of each body shall cast the deciding vote.

IX. COMMITTEES

- A. Each House has from 13 to 15 Standing Committees, ranging from 5 to 15 members each.
- B. The presiding officer designates the chairman and vice-chairman of each
- C. The committee system divides up the work of the legislature.
 - 1. Bills are assigned, after second reading, by the presiding officer to a specific committee, and committees do one of the following in acting upon a bill:
 - a) Holds bill without taking any action thereon.
 - b) Holds bill but substitutes and report out another similar bill.
 - c) Reports bill out of committee to floor of Senate or House as follows:
 - 1) Favorable or "Do Pass."
- 4) Majority and Minority report.
- 2) "Do Pass" with amendment. 3) "Do Not Pass."
- 5) No Recommendation.
- 2. A bill may be removed from a committee by:
- a) A majority vote in the Senate, and
- b) Majority vote of the House.
- D. The real work of the Legislature is done in committee.
 - 1. Here the public has the opportunity to testify in favor or opposition of a bill.

X. KINDS OF LEGISLATIVE MEASURES

- A. A Bill is a proposed law. All statutes except those initiated by the people must be enacted through a bill.
- B, Joint Resolution is used for the purpose of proposing:
 - 1. Constitutional amendments
 - 2. Creating interim committees
 - 3. Giving directions to a state agency or officer
 - 4. Expressing legislative approval of action taken by someone else
 - 5. Authorizing some kind of temporary action to be taken
 - 6. Authorizing expenditures out of legislative expense appropriation
- C. Concurrent Resolution is used only for matters affecting
 - 1. Operations and procedures of the legislature such as joint sessions
 - 2. Appointment of joint committees
 - 3. Official expression of condolence or congratulations
 - 4. Adjournment sine die (without day to reconvene)
- D. Joint Memorial issued to make request upon, or an expression of opinion to
 - 1. Congress

- 3. Both
- 2. President of the United States
- 4. Expression of opinion.
- E. Resolution is used by a single house affecting its own concern or procedure which is:
 - 1. Appointing a committee of its own members
 - 2. Making an expression of opinion or sentiment on matters of public
- F. Memorial is used when a single house takes action of a character for which both houses would use a Joint Memorial.

XI. PARTS OF A BILL

- A. There are three parts of a bill. They are:
 - 1. Title on what the bill covers. For instance, "Relating to consumer protection."
 - a) Any section of the Oregon law to be amended, repealed or to have new provision created for, must be mentioned. For instance, "amending ORS 20.080; repealing ORS 646.210."
 - b) If emergency clause is attached to the bill, the title must mention this.
 - 2. Enacting clause which is "Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon."
 - 3. Body of Bill
 - a) Here is set forth the proposal or purpose of the bill; the section to be amended, new sections created, etc.
 - b) In the printed bill, "new" matter is in solid print and matter to be deleted is in italic and bracketed.
- B. Any proposed bill may be obtained in the Bill Room, State Capitol.

XII. STEPS IN ENACTING A BILL

- A. A Legislator or Committee submits a bill for drafting—generally to Legislative Counsel.
- B. The typed draft is then delivered to the requestor.
- C. Who delivers it to the Secretary of Senate or Chief Clerk of the House.
- D. Who sends it to Engrossing & Enrolling who checks it for proper Form & Style and then sends it to the state printer.
- E. Bill then read first time by title only.
- F. Bill then read the second day also by title only.
- G. Bill then assigned to appropriate committee by the presiding officer.
- H. Standing committee then studies bill, holds hearing, amends etc., as previously set forth.
- If amendments are numerous bill might be "engrossed" which means having bill reprinted as amended.
- J. If bill reported out, of committee the chairman signs report and the report delivered to Secretary of the Senate, or Chief Clerk of the House.
- K. The report returned to the body such as "The Local Government Committee recommends the passage of Senate Bill 15 as amended".
- L. If bill receives a constitutional majority it is declared passed and sent to other body.
- M. The other house then goes through same process as outlined above, including first and second readings, assignment to committee, hearing, etc.

- N. If bill receives constitutional majority it then goes to house of origination for enrollment.
 - If bill amended in the second house then necessary to send to first house for concurrence on amendment.
 - 2. If first house does not concur in amendments, a committee is then chosen from each house. This is known as conference committee.
 - 3. If both houses accept conference committee report, the bill is deemed passed and then enrolled.
- O. Bill then signed by
 - Secretary of the Senate, if originating in Senate; or by Chief Clerk of the House, if originating in House.
 - 2. Speaker of the House.
 - 3. President of the Senate.
- P. Enrolled bill goes to Governor.
- Q. Enrolled bill becomes law if
 - 1. Governor signs, or fails to sign but does not veto.
 - 2. Both houses pass over Governor's veto.
 - 3. People approve by vote if enrolled bill is referred to them by the legislature.
- R. Then enrolled bill filed with Secretary of State, who also assigns Chapter number for session Laws.
- S. The enrolled bill then inserted into the appropriate place or places in the Oregon Revised Statutes.

XIII. WHO MAY INTRODUCE BILLS

- A. One or more members of either House or members of both Houses.
 - 1. If both a Senator and Representative sponsor bill, it is necessary to decide which will introduce it first.
- B. A Standing Committee of one of the Houses.
- C. Individual citizens or groups interested in introducing a bill must do it through one of these two methods.
- D. Revenue measures must originate in the House.
- E. The Speaker of the House or President of the Senate may also order introduction of bills.

XIV. WHO PREPARES BILL FOR INTRODUCTION

- A. Anyone may draft a bill, however, because even the most simple bill requires careful preparation, special attorneys will do the majority of the work.
- B. The Legislative Counsel, a group of lawyers specializing in bill drafting, is responsible for drafting most of the bills introduced in the legislative process.

XV. WHEN BILLS MAY BE INTRODUCED

- A. Senate and House rules require bills be introduced before the 36th day.
- B. Introduction after this date requires permission from rules committee.
- C. True substitute bills are exception—as well as all Ways and Means bills.
- D. Approximately 2,000 bills are introduced each session.
- E. Less than 1/3 of bills introduced will be passed into law.

XVI. RECORD OF LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

- A. In both House and Senate a Journal is kept.
 - Summary of various items of business transacted on floor of House such as
 - a) Time of convening
 - b) Record of those present and absent
 - c) Report of committees
 - d) Reading of bills and measures
 - e) How every member voted on a measure, etc.
- B. A "Calendar" is prepared in each house daily and printed and placed on each member's desk.
 - A cumulative index to bills, Resolutions and Memorials previously introduced, is also printed and available both to members and the public.

XVII. LOBBYING AND LOBBYISTS

- A. The lobbyist serves as an information agent for both the legislators and the group he represents.
 - He may represent civic groups, interested citizens, business associations, etc.
 - He provides expert witnesses, develops background material and gives assistance to lawmakers.
 - 3. Lobbyists are considered an integral part of the law-making process.
- B. Lobbyists are required to register with the Legislative Assembly and adhere to certain policies.
- C. The Legislative Counsel publishes a book containing names of Lobbyists and Lobby organizations.

XVIII. WHEN LAWS BECOME EFFECTIVE

- Constitution provides that laws become effective 90 days after adjournment, unless otherwise provided.
- B. On a measure having the emergency clause attached thereto, the effective date is the date it is signed by the Governor.
- C. Emergency clause cannot be attached to tax or revenue measure.
