Message from Community Action



Dear Friends:

In 1965, concern over the causes and conditions of poverty motivated a group of Washington County leaders to organize Community Action. More than 40 years later, there is still a genuine concern within our community about the hardships of poverty and the impact that poverty has on children and families. Community Action is proud to serve as a leader and a partner in the fight to reduce the effects of poverty on the thousands of Washington County families. We are making progress in this fight but there are still mountains to climb. The poverty rate in Washington County has grown six times faster than our general population growth, surpassing any other urban county in Oregon. Washington County has among the highest housing costs in the state and exceeds the national averages when comparing cost of living to wages. On any given night, over 1,200 children and adults are homeless. Since 2000, low wage industries have accounted for all net job growth in Oregon, and now 1/3 of all jobs in our state are low wage jobs. These facts may seem daunting but, as you will see in this report, positive change is taking place.

As we look ahead, programmatic innovation and creative collaborations are shaping the future for Community Action. During the past year Community Action partnered with a grassroots, inter-faith initiative in West County to raise awareness about homelessness and expand support for our shelter. We joined together with a four county effort, called *Bridges to Housing*, to serve high need homeless families. This project provides intensive case management and access to affordable housing to help these families achieve housing stability. We continue to work with the Coffee Creek Correctional Facility to provide a ground-breaking early childhood education program for incarcerated mothers and their young children. And a collaborative partnership with several health care agencies is making it possible for high risk, low-income pregnant women to receive the prenatal care and parenting support needed for a healthy birth. These are just a few examples of the synergy taking place with those who are committed to addressing issues of poverty in partnership with Community Action.

None of this would be possible without a meaningful commitment from our City, County and State leaders and the dedication our partners, funders and friends. Working together, we are providing the hope and the help needed for children to thrive and for low-income families to live with dignity and security. And when we succeed, our communities are stronger and the horizon is brighter for future generations.

We hope this report will enhance your understanding of Community Action and that you will be inspired to join us as we continue the quest to address the causes and conditions of poverty in Washington County.

50,493 Washington County residents live below the Federal Poverty Level, which is defined as \$17,170 per year for a family of three.

128,912 Washington County residents are considered low income and have family incomes equal to or less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level.

31% of those living below the Federal Poverty Level in Washington County are children.



44% of all Washington County renters pay over 30% of their household income for rent. **22%** pay over 50%.

Locally, there is a three year waiting list of over **6,000** households seeking subsidized housing vouchers.

In 2007, **4,222** households were evicted from their homes in Washington County.

During the 2006-2007 school year, **1,640** Washington County students were homeless.

Community Action is one of 18 Community Action Organizations in Oregon and 1,200 nation-wide. Community Action was formed after passage of the U.S. Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 to address issues of poverty.

Family & Community Resources



A growing number of families in Washington County are one crisis away from facing poverty. Unexpected illness, the loss of a job or other unanticipated circumstances can substantially weaken a family's financial footing and force them to choose between paying rent or buying food. Community Action offers hope, help and change by providing assistance and support when it is needed most.

HOUSING & HOMELESS SERVICES Community Action houses and shelters homeless families, advocates for homeless children to ensure school success and assists families in achieving housing stability.

ENERGY & EMERGENCY RENT ASSISTANCE Community Action prevents homelessness and assures that families can remain safe and warm in their homes by providing financial assistance for those facing eviction or termination of heat and electricity services.

WEATHERIZATION Community Action helps families reduce energy bills by assessing home energy use, recommending and implementing cost saving measures, and by identifying available resources to improve energy efficiency.

CHILD CARE RESOURCE & REFERRAL Community Action provides access to quality, affordable child care by connecting parents with a network of providers and by offering training to child care providers and businesses with on-site child care programs.

OPENING DOORS Community Action provides prenatal and parenting support that connects low-income women with the resources for a healthy birth and successful parenting.

INFORMATION & REFERRAL Community Action is the Washington County partner for *211 Info*, a four county collaboration providing information and referral to critical health and human service needs.





2006-2007 Community Impact



1,572 parents were able to go to work or school because they could access quality, affordable child care.

The quality of local child care resources improved as **1,363** providers participated in **11,861** hours of training in early childhood development.

With access to appropriate prenatal services, **511** low-income pregnant women were better equipped for a healthy birth.

87 at-risk pregnant women received comprehensive services to enable healthy delivery and **93%** gave birth to healthy babies.

109 at-risk families received parenting support to prevent child abuse and neglect.

198 homeless children and parents had the chance to get back on their feet by staying at Community Action's Family Shelter and also receiving a range of services to help them achieve housing stability.

8,131 families stayed warm and safe in their homes with heat and electricity bill paying assistance from Community Action.

558 families facing eviction remained in their homes because of rent assistance provided by Community Action.

286 families had lower fuel costs and warmer homes because Community Action provided weatherization services.

By dialing 211, **14,046** callers were connected with vital health and social services.





Community Action Head Start



Community Action plays a vital role in early childhood education by providing a comprehensive program that prepares low-income and special needs pre-school children for educational success and engages parents in their child's learning and in leadership development activities.

Community Action Head Start serves Washington County children, ages 0 to 5, in the Hillsboro, Beaverton, Tigard and Tualatin school districts.

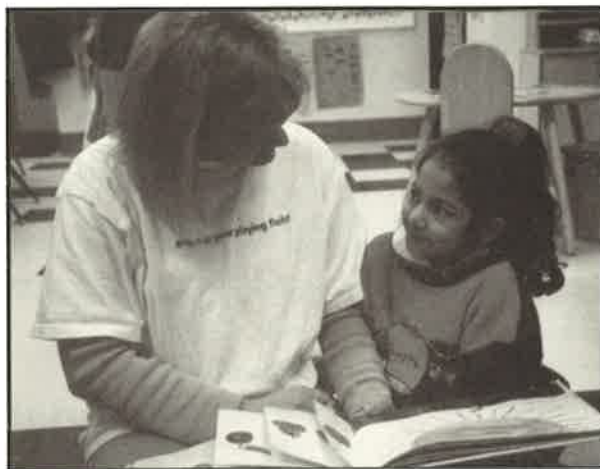
2006-2007 Impact

790 preschool children gained a solid educational foundation by participating in Community Action's Head Start program.

306 Head Start graduates transitioned into kindergarten classrooms in Washington County schools and were ready to learn.

15% of children served were diagnosed with disabilities.

24% of classroom teachers are current or former parents of Head Start students.



Community Action also provides comprehensive health assessment and services.

12% of children received medical treatment.

26% of children received dental treatment.

11% of children received mental health treatment.

A number of children were also diagnosed and treated for hearing or vision difficulties, asthma, obesity and diabetes.

Children who complete Head Start are fully prepared for school.



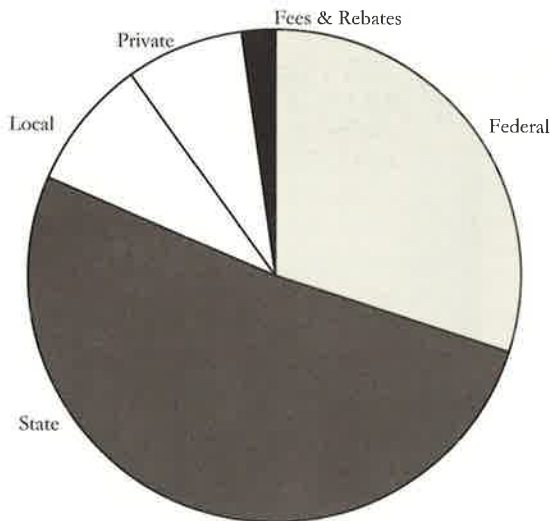


2006-2007 Financial Report



Community Action is committed to the highest standards of financial stewardship of our funds. In 2006-2007 we received over **\$15 million** in financial support from a broad range of sources. This includes individuals, businesses, corporations, foundations, faith based organizations, civic groups, community organizations, United Way, local government, and state and federal grants. Revenue is also generated through fees and rebates. Community Action received the highest possible rating following our independent audit for 2006-2007.

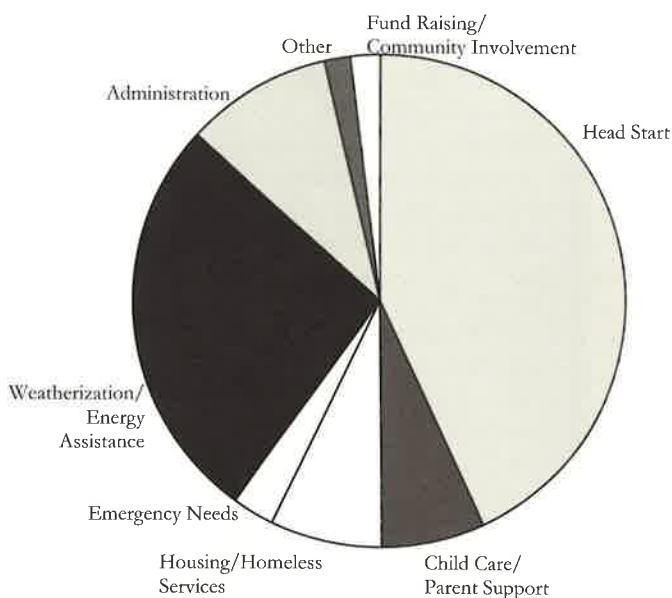

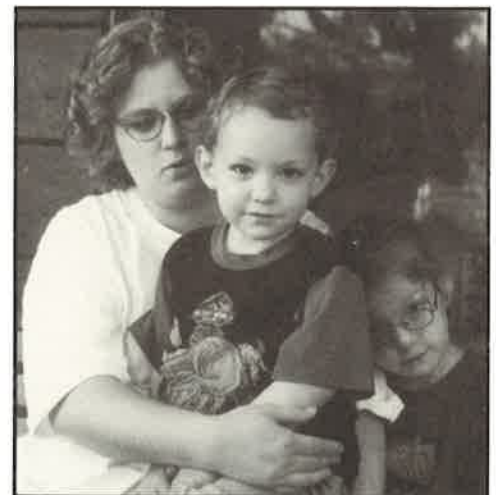
