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
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Small University...




Internships.


If you'd like to try working abroad, Pacific can arrange that, too. In addition to regular internships, the University offers overseas internships in a number of countries.

Encouraging the free exchange of ideas among Pacific Rim nations, The Pacific Intercultural Institute is one of the cornerstones of the University's commitment to preparing you for the world of tomorrow. The Institute seeks to deepen intercultural relationships with Pacific nations and prepare business people and community leaders for the Pacific Century ahead of us. Through the Institute, students have access to courses in Japanese and Chinese language, economics, society and culture, history, and teacher education. Other cultures of the Pacific Rim are included in new and developing courses and programs. An English Language Institute brings students from all over the world to Pacific University, adding a richness and diversity to campus life.



Other enlightening opportunities.

A variety of other Pacific programs expose you to new ideas and other ways of thinking. Joint research with Pacific's faculty involves students at all levels. Past projects have included long-lasting batteries for space ships, nematodes for crop and insect control, and a study of the Holocaust. Pacific's unique interdisciplinary Peace and Conflict Studies program explores the causes and resolution of conflict, drawing on faculty from all departments. The University's annual debate series, run by students, lets you hear the opinions of such notables as William F. Buckley, Robert Bork, Jeane Kirkpatrick, Andrew Young, Patricia Schroeder and Arthur Schlesinger on everything from national defense to environmental protection. The acclaimed Portland Arts and Lectures series, co-sponsored by Pacific University, brings such literary stars as John Updike, Annie Dillard, Norman Mailer and Susan Sontag to the community.





Pacific University is located in Forest Grove, a beautiful, secluded rural community 25 minutes west of downtown Portland. Forest Grove.


Perhaps one of the best things about Pacific is Forest Grove. The town has grown up around the University and Pacific is still the center of life for the community. Main Street runs parallel to campus and provides everything a student needs from local banks to pizza parlors.





The Great Outdoors

If you like the great outdoors, you've come to the right place. Pacific University is surrounded by it. The Oregon coast is just 45 minutes from the campus. Mt. Hood and some of the best skiing in the Northwest, downhill (year-round) and cross-country, is just a 90-minute drive. The Columbia River Gorge, a few miles east of Portland, offers hiking trails and spectacular waterfalls, and is famous for its world-class windsurfing area. Hagg Lake, three miles from campus, is a favorite springtime destination for Pacific students and a cycling center for the area.



Campus visits.

The best way to get a feel for whether Pacific is right for you is to visit the campus. The Office of Admission is eager to arrange for prospective students to tour the campus, sit in on classes, or speak with a professor, coach or students.

For applicants wishing to spend the night in the residence halls, student hosts have extra beds in their rooms and will introduce you to other Pacific students while you are on campus.



Directions to campus:

From airport by bus—Take the Downtown Airporter service to Fifth Avenue in downtown Portland. From there, take the #57 bus (Portland's Tri-Met bus service) to Forest Grove. The bus stops right in front of the campus.

From Portland by car—Take Highway 26 west to Route 6, Forest Grove/Tillamook. Continue south on Route 47, Banks/Forest Grove, approximately nine miles to the campus.


A Few Details...

Prospective students should know what the Admission Office looks for when considering an application. Every part of the process is important. Transcripts and standardized test scores are an indication of a student's ability to undertake a challenging academic curriculum. The essay provides an opportunity for personal expression and expanding upon the talents, experiences and extenuating circumstances that make you unique. The recommendation is a reaffirmation of a student's potential and an interview allows applicants to make sure that all their questions have been asked and answered.

Beyond test scores and grade point averages, Pacific looks for extra-curricular involvement. Accelerated and honors courses are taken into consideration. Positions of leadership and responsibility are important. Above all, Pacific looks for students who will not only participate, but who will be successful at the university.

Freshmen.

Application requirements for entering freshman include: a completed application form and application fee; an official transcript of high school course work; SAT, WPCT or ACT scores; and a counselor recommendation. An interview with a representative of the Admission office is optional, but advised.

Transfers.

Application requirements include: a completed application form and application fee; transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended (applicants with less than 30 college credit hours must also submit a high school transcript with SAT or ACT scores); and a counselor recommendation. An interview with a representative of the Admission office is optional, but advised.

Financial Aid

Pacific University has an aggressive financial assistance program designed to make "the Pacific difference" affordable to all qualified students. Academic Scholarships of up to \$5,000 per year; talent awards in music, speech and debate, and athletics; and Challenge Awards, based on financial need, supplement other types of assistance to make a Pacific education affordable to almost any student.

In 1988-89, a full 87 percent of our students received more than \$6.2 million in grants, loans, scholarships and work/study programs. An average of \$8,800 was received per student.

All students, regardless of need, should submit a Financial Aid Form (FAF) to the College Scholarship Service between January 1 and February 15. FAF forms may be obtained from the Financial Aid Office at Pacific or from your current school. Transfer students must send Pacific a financial aid transcript from each college or university attended.



Application calendar

Applications will be received beginning November 1, and all applicants are encouraged to apply as early as possible. Completed applications received by March 15 will be notified of the university's decision after April 1. Applications received after our notification date will be handled on a rolling admissions basis and acceptances will be made on a space-available basis.
