Pacific University Serves Its Community

Contrary to the popular conception of a college, Pacific University does not hide within its ivy-clad walls. Founded by early pioneers in the area, the University still remains an important part of the community it serves. That this is true is borne out by the following list of services which the university provides:

The campus and its buildings are in constant demand and use by civic, educational and religious groups wishing to avail themselves of the facilities.

University's Carnegie library is open to all who wish to take advantage of its thousands of volumes as well as its depository for all federal documents.

University's Speakers bureau has outstanding faculty members in practically all fields who are available to speak before groups anywhere in the area when invited.

Drama and speech departments in addition to providing a high standard of entertainment also offer remedial assistance in speech handicaps.

Department of education works closely with the secondary and elementary schools of the county through its comprehensive teacher education program.

Sociology department through its research in all fields is accumulating and dispensing valuable information for those interested in the healthy growth of this area.

School of music through its musical aptitude testing program makes it possible for the children of the area to determine early their proper field of endeavor.

College of optometry through its clinic gives much needed service to those with visual difficulties.

University Museum serves a vital need in the community in its role of depository for records and relics of pioneer history of Washington country and as a source of information and education for school children and adults of the area.

Members of the faculty are active in civic, fraternal, social and religious organizations throughout the county.

The foregoing services are but a few of the ways in which Pacific University has made itself a vital part of the community life. Its future is definitely tied in with the future of the area.
